Center City Developments: Sustaining Momentum

From the transformation of Market Street's former department store corridor, to the completion of the tallest building in the Philadelphia skyline, to the expansion of housing development throughout all of Greater Center City, 16.1 million square feet of construction has just been completed, is underway or is the planning stage downtown.

Building upon a decade-long, sustained national economic expansion, development of all types, including five public space projects, new hotels, education and cultural developments, are occurring simultaneously across Center City.

As highlighted in our annual *Center City Developments* real estate report, 23 development projects totaling \$2.8 billion were completed in Center City between Fairmount and Washington avenues, river to river, in the period from January 1, 2018 to August 31, 2019. Eighteen projects totaling \$3 billion in new investment were under construction as of September 1, 2019. Another 21 projects with a total estimated development value of \$1 billion are in the planning or proposal phase.


Center City Developments (available for download at centercityphila.org/developments) is a detailed compilation of 62 major projects

in Center City. The publication includes images and information on projects with an estimated development value of \$6.8 billion.

For the first time this year, we've made available a digital interactive companion to this publication: a searchable, online map that features all of the information found within the printed publication. It will be continually updated as Center City projects are announced, modified and completed.

THE FASHION DISTRICT AND EAST MARKET STREET

One of Center City's most recently completed major developments is also one of the largest: Fashion District Philadelphia, which celebrated its grand opening on September 19 after a four-year, \$420 million overhaul. Spanning three city blocks, the project

features more than 900,000 square feet of retail, food and entertainment offerings, along with \$1 million in public art and a diverse schedule of cultural events.

Renovated by developers PREIT and Macerich, the Fashion District reconnects to Market and Filbert streets with 20 pedestrian entrances as well as new sidewalk cafes, new digital signage and a redesigned streetscape. Joining the recently completed East Market mixeduse development on the 1100 block, Fashion District helps links Center City's historic district with nearby hotels, the Reading Terminal Market, the Pennsylvania Convention Center and Jefferson Station.

SPOTLIGHT ON RETAIL, RESIDENTIAL, AND OFFICE SECTORS

At a September event hosted by Central Philadelphia Redevelopment Corporation to mark the release of the Center City Developments report, three major developers highlighted how their projects responded to changing economic and demographic trends and the opportunities and challenges in our current development climate. PREIT's Heather Crowell focused on how their project responded to the public's changing expectations for experience retail. Jim Pearlstein of Pearl Properties, which built The Harper mixed-use development at 19th and Chestnut streets, noted that while Center City is attracting many new residents and has the momentum for continued growth,

addressing quality-of-life challenges like litter, homelessness, congestion and noise is crucial. Brian Berson of Parkway Corporation, developer of a new office building at 23rd and Market, focused on the increasing demand from tenants for mixed-use sites that are rich with amenities. 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In June, Philadelphia Police Captain Nashid Akil became the new Commanding Officer of the Center City District Police Substation, located within CCD's administrative offices. He joined the force in 1998 and has served in police districts throughout the city. Now, he oversees a district comprised of about 70 officers who cover Center City on bicycles, on foot and by car.

Akil grew up in North Philadelphia and worked for former City Councilwoman Augusta Clarke in his youth, but he was inspired to pursue a life of public service by two cousins on the force. One of them, Police Officer Lamar Poole, was off duty when he was killed on his motorcycle by a hit-and-run driver in 2015.

"He was an older cousin I looked up to, and I remember him joining the police academy. And telling me how he loved it," he recalled of Poole, whose department photo is displayed in Akil's office. "I remember the fire in his eyes when he talked about his job."

Akil noted that the resurgent challenges of homelessness and addiction, while occurring citywide, create a unique set of challenges in Center City. (One initiative responding to these challenges, a collaboration with Project HOME, police and CCD's Community Service Representatives, is detailed on page 5.)

Among his department's key roles are ensuring that officers in the district are highly visible, courteous and helpful to residents, businesses and tourists.

"When people come to Philadelphia from other places, it's Center City where they're spending their time," Akil said. "Our job is to make sure people who are here feel safe. If you're visiting, I want you to leave with the image that you went somewhere great."

Outdoor Seating 2019

Since the CCD began gathering data in 2001 on downtown establishments that provided outdoor seating, the number of seats has steadily increased. That trend has continued in 2019, with locations throughout Center City providing a record number of 6,969 seats, a 5% increase from 2018. Outdoor seating has been a long-term indicator of Center City's vibrancy since sidewalk cafés were first authorized in 1995.

Center City District will be planting 50 more trees this fall as part of our ongoing Plant Center City initiative. These new trees, along with 50 that were added last spring, will bring us halfway to our goal of adding 200 new trees to the downtown by the end of 2020.

Urban greening offers dramatic and measurable improvements:

- Trees provide more shade for people walking on sidewalks
- Trees help cool the air and respond to climate change
- Trees clean the air
- Trees conserve energy

There are about 2,300 street trees within CCD's boundaries, including 700 that we planted and have maintained since the 1990s. Plant Center City is working to increase that number by adding to our canopy of healthy

street trees, replacing damaged trees and expanding our existing schedule of pruning, watering, fertilization and pest management.

Homeless Outreach Continues in Center City

The second year of the Ambassadors of Hope, an innovative outreach program to help address the resurgence of panhandling and homelessness in Center City (ranked as the top two concerns among respondents to a CCD survey last fall), is continuing to yield positive results.

Funded and launched by the CCD and implemented in partnership with Project HOME, the Philadelphia Police Department and the city's Department of Behavioral Health, the outreach effort helped more than 130 people come off the street during its inaugural year in 2018. Rechristened the Ambassadors of Hope by Sister Mary Scullion, the 2019 outreach teams are achieving greater success this year. As of October 8, 2019, with six more weeks remaining in the scheduled program, teams have persuaded 142 individuals to come off the street; eight more individuals were transported by emergency medical treatment units to local hospitals; six required psychiatric intervention.

Specially trained, interdisciplinary teams of social workers from Project HOME, police officers and CCD's outreach teams patrol together five days a week, engaging homeless individuals and panhandlers, offering off-street alternatives. CCD immediately transports those who accept help to shelter and housing. Those who choose to remain have complied with directives to abide by the City's Sidewalk Behavior Ordinance. No one has been arrested and no citations have been issued by police.

The outreach teams meet weekly with the Ambassadors of Hope program administrators and service providers, to coordinate follow-up for those who receive placement to help prevent their return to the street, and to discuss strategies for reaching those who are resistant to accepting help.

Center City's Least Favorite Bug

The CCD has received a number of emails and calls regarding sightings within Center City of the Spotted Lanternfly. While its favorite host plant, the Ailanthus tree, is plentiful in the area, this invasive bug is also a threat to local hardwoods found on our streets and in our parks and woodlands. In the fall, these bugs will lay egg masses with 30-50 eggs each.

The state Department of Agriculture advises that people should kill these destructive insects on sight and immediately report sightings online at agriculture.pa.gov or by calling [888]4BADFLY.


